The application of Flint & Harrod for a retail liquor license was filed together with their bond. The bond was approved and the clerk was instructed to issue them a license for three months from April 1st.

The matter of filling the vacancy in the office of county commissioner was considered. A certificate of nomination from a caucus meeting of Democrats of Layton precinct nominating Schofield Kershaw, was filed.

Commissioner Parker made the motion that Schofield Kershaw be appointed to the office of county commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. M. Layton. There being no second to the motion there was no appointment made.

On motion Philo Dibble was appointed to the office of road supervisor for the 19th road district, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. M. Layton as supervisor of said district.

The reports of A. M. Lamb, justice of the peace, in the case of state of Utah vs. Joseph C. Manning and in the case of state of Utah vs. Jas. Warren were read and ordered filed.

The county assessor reported he had appointed J. E. Robinson as deputy assessor. On motion the appointment was confirmed.

The petition of C. H. Walker et al., a king for an appropriation to fix Clark lane, was referred to Commissioner Fisher.

The claim of the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Co. for rent of telephone from April 1st to June 30th, was presented and laid over and the clerk was instructed to notify the company to remove the instrument, unless better terms can be had.

The claim of the Bountiful Lumber & Building Association was presented and referred back for verification.

The petition of T. J. Robins, asking to be reimbursed for the burial expenses of Thomas Stevens, an indigent person, was read and on motion an appropriation of \$20 was made for said purpose.
